

To the People and Clergy of the Archdiocese of Melbourne

Dear friends in Christ,



We proclaim a crucified Christ

As we now welcome the beginnings of easing in COVID-19 Restrictions in Victoria, I would like to take this opportunity to write to you, the Clergy and people of our Archdiocese. It is great news that regional Victoria will, from tonight, move into the Third Step of the Roadmap to reopening, which includes our parishes located outside the metropolitan zone. However, we have a long way to go.

The deprivation in sacramental life has been a profound loss for our people. As well as all the other sufferings of the Pandemic, the sense of estrangement from the Eucharist has been a particular struggle for Catholics. The Mass is our primary means of gathering together in faith; it is the source and summit of our Christian life, and its life-giving nourishment and healing is dearly missed.

In the midst of this loss, I am grateful to our Priests and Deacons for continuing to serve the faithful, for sharing a sacramental ministry even under strict conditions, and for being alongside our people and their loved ones in times of death and grief. Thank you for your faithfulness.

All of us are anxious to open church doors, but I want to emphasise our need to be creative in the ways we do so, especially with the thousands of children who have been waiting for Sacraments of Initiation. Countless Catholic families are awaiting Baptism, Reconciliation, Holy Communion and Confirmation for their children. Adults, too, have longed to be received into the life of the Church. We shall be exploring possibilities such as outdoor liturgies in parish and school settings to facilitate these crucial events of grace and welcome.

Throughout the pandemic, I have been advocating directly with the Government, reminding authorities continually of our respectful compliance with each stage of restrictions, and seeking a fair consideration in what is permitted. The Catholic community throughout the pandemic has been constructive and positive. We have, and continue to act in a mature way, caring for the safety and vulnerability of Victorians facing great risk.

Thankfully the signs of driving down COVID numbers are looking good at this moment and Catholics join other people of faith in giving thanks for this outcome and working to ensure the steps ahead do not take us backward.

Now, it is essential that the Government does not treat faith communities as an afterthought to the opening up of other sectors. Our churches are locations for communities of care and essential service, and must be treated fairly and reasonably.

Practically speaking, I have been in discussion with the Premier to thank him for overturning the restriction on spiritual ministry to the sick and the dying, and have assured him that the Catholic Church is able to manage restrictions (including good hygiene, face coverings, social distancing and density requirements). If pubs and restaurants can open, then places of worship should be open under similar conditions and numbers.

If case numbers track well, I expect we will see larger outdoor gatherings in regional Victoria become possible over the next few weeks, and proportionate opportunities for gathering in metropolitan Melbourne. I am hopeful that this may occur sometime in October, which would be a deeply welcomed improvement on the current Roadmap indications. If we can open our churches, even for outdoor gatherings, then we should open them.

The Deputy Premier and the Multicultural Affairs Minister are conducting discussions this month through the Multifaith Leaders Forum. The Archdiocese will be contributing to these meetings. In addition I will continue to engage with the Premier and Ministers directly on the Church's need for opening doors, carefully and safely.

Be assured of my ongoing closeness in prayer and concern. I have heard your cry, and I am working to bring your voice to the authorities. The Lord has promised he will be with us always; let us place our hope in Him.

When making an offertory online, parishioners have the option to choose which collection they would like to partake in, as they usually would during Sunday Mass - first collection, second collection or a parish appeal.



INVITATION TO ALL OUR ST ANTHONY'S AND ST BERNARD'S PARISHIONERS

LOUIS DE MONTFORT 'TOTAL CONSECRATION TO JESUS THROUGH MARY'.



As Fr Fabian has consecrated our parishes, a group of us are also doing the Louis de Montfort '**Total Consecration to Jesus through Mary**' to consecrate ourselves and our families with him. In these uncertain and difficult times when most people seems to struggle to find something to depend on, we should cling all the more to our God Who gives us strength.

St Louis de Montfort wrote "We ought to belong to Jesus Christ, and to serve Him not only as mercenary servants, but as loving slaves who, as a result of their great love, give themselves up to serve Him in the quality of slaves simply for the honor of belonging to Him". He also wrote that "Our Blessed Lady is the means Our Lord made use of to come to us" and "The strongest inclination of Mary is to unite us to Jesus Christ, her Son". So it is fitting that we "call ourselves and make ourselves the loving slaves of the most holy Virgin, in order to be, by that very means, the more perfectly the slaves of Jesus Christ."

The consecration consists of **33 days of preparation** including daily prayer, readings and spiritual exercises to prepare us for the consecration. We will be starting on the 19th of October, for our consecration day to be the 21st of November, the Feast of the Presentation of our Lady.

We will be having a **briefing session on Wednesday the 30th of September at 8pm on Zoom** to talk more about the details of the consecration. 

Dear parishioners of St Bernard's,

Masses remain suspended. At 11.59pm on Wednesday, 16th September 2020, regional Victoria moved to 'Step 2' in the State Government's reopening plan. Whilst this means that restaurants and other similar places of public gathering will be able to have 10 people indoors and 50 people outdoors, places of worship are limited to 10 people outdoors for non-ceremonial gatherings, 20 people indoors for funerals, and 10 people indoors for weddings. The reason for the inequitable treatment of places of worship under the 'Step 2' plan is unclear. The Archbishop is attempting to clarify these regulations and have them amended.

Given these restrictions, it is not yet possible for us to resume public Masses. This may change quickly as further advice is provided to us. Please check our website regularly for updated information. If you have any sacramental or spiritual need, please do not hesitate to contact the parish office. We look forward to reopening as soon as possible.

Archbishop Comensoli's Letter to the Faithful of the Archdiocese. On Wednesday, 16th September, Archbishop Comensoli published an encouraging letter to the faithful. He reflects upon the sense of spiritual deprivation and loss we feel at the moment and outlines the ways he is actively working to reopen our churches. Seeking Expressions of Interest

St Bernard's Property Development Advisory Committee

The COVID-related shutdown of parish activities has highlighted the importance of diversifying our parish's income streams. Previous generations of priests and parishioners have bequeathed to us a number of assets that remain under-utilised. Prudent redevelopment of some of these under-utilised assets could provide the parish with a reliable supplementary source of income.

At our Annual General Meeting held on Thursday, the decision was made to form a Property Development Advisory Committee. This Committee will have the task of canvassing options for the redevelopment of the parish's various properties with the aim of securing the parish's financial future. The first stage of the Property Development Advisory Committee's work will be to prepare a preliminary report that outlines different ways of generating income from the aforementioned properties. This report will be submitted to Father Fabian, the Parish Pastoral Council, and the Parish Finance Committee for review, before being shared with parishioners for their feedback. Following that feedback and the approval of the Finance Committee, the Property Development Advisory Committee may then be tasked to engage professional assistance in refining one or more of these options for further review and realisation. Membership of the Property Development Advisory Committee could, therefore, involve a two to three-year commitment, with meetings held as required.

Parishioners are invited to express their interest in membership of the Development Advisory Committee. The Committee will consist of Father Marcus (chair) and between 4-6 parishioners, at least one of whom must also be a member of the Parish Finance Committee. We would particularly welcome expressions of interest from parishioners with experience in one or more of the following areas: project management, law, construction, finance, local government, planning. Expressions of interest should be submitted in writing by post or email to the Parish Office by close of business Friday, 9th October 2020. Expressions of interest should also identify how long you have been a parishioner, any other ways you have been involved in the parish, and any other relevant experience you have.

The Seven Sorrows Devotion

The Blessed Virgin Mary grants seven graces to the souls who honour her daily saying seven Hail Mary's and meditating on her tears and sorrows.

The devotion was passed on by St. Bridget

HERE ARE THE SEVEN GRACES:

- 1. I will grant peace to their families.
- 2. They will be enlightened about the divine mysteries.
- I will console them in their pains and I will accompany them in their work.
- I will give them as much as they ask for as long as it does not oppose the adorable will of my divine Son or the sanctification of their souls.
- I will defend them in their spiritual battles with the infernal enemy and I will protect them at every instant of their lives.
- I will visibly help them at the moment of their death, they will see the face of their Mother.
- 7. I have obtained from my divine Son, that those who propagate this devotion to my tears and sorrows, will be taken directly from this earthly life to eternal happiness since all their sins will be forgiven and my Son and I will be their eternal consolation and joy.

SEVEN SORROWS

- 1. The prophecy of Simeon. (St. Luke 2:34, 35)
- 2. The flight into Egypt. (St. Matthew 2:13, 14)
- 3. The loss of the Child Jesus in the temple. (St. Luke 2: 43-45)
- 4. The meeting of Jesus and Mary on the Way of the Cross.
- 5. The Crucifixion.
- 6. The taking down of the Body of Jesus from the Cross.
- The burial of Jesus.

1. The prophecy of Simeon: "And Simeon blessed them, and said to Mary his mother: Behold this child is set for the fall and for the resurrection of many in Israel, and for a sign which shall be contradicted; And thy own soul a sword shall pierce, that out of many hearts thoughts may be revealed." – Luke II, 34-35.

Meditation: How great was the shock to Mary's Heart at hearing the sorrowful words, in which holy Simeon told the bitter Passion and death of her sweet Jesus, since in that same moment she realized in her mind all the insults, blows, and torments which the impious men were to offer to the Redeemer of the world. But a still sharper sword pierced her soul. It was the thought of men's ingratitude to her beloved Son. Now consider that because of your sins you are unhappily among the ungrateful. **Say one Hail Mary**

2. The flight into Egypt: "And after they (the wise men) departed, behold an angel of the Lord appeared in sleep to Joseph, saying: Arise and take the child and His mother and fly into Egypt: and be there until I shall tell you. For it will come to pass that Herod will seek the child to destroy Him. Who arose and took the child and His mother by night, and retired into Egypt: and He was there until the death of Herod." – Matt. II, 13-14.

Meditation: Consider the sharp sorrow which Mary felt when, St. Joseph being warned by an angel, she had to flee by night in order to preserve her beloved Child from the slaughter decreed by Herod. What anguish was hers, in leaving Judea, lest she should be overtaken by the soldiers of the cruel king! How great her privations in that long journey! What sufferings she bore in that land of exile, what sorrow amid that people given to idolatry! But consider how often you have renewed that bitter grief of Mary, when your sins have caused her Son to flee from your heart. **Say one Hail Mary**

3. The loss of the Child Jesus in the temple: "And having fulfilled the days, when they returned, the Child Jesus remained in Jerusalem; and His parents knew it not. And thinking that he was in the company, they came a day's journey, and sought him among their kinsfolk and acquaintance. And not finding Him, they returned into Jerusalem, seeking Him." Luke II, 43-45.

Meditation: How dread was the grief of Mary, when she saw that she had lost her beloved Son! And as if to increase her sorrow, when she sought Him diligently among her kinsfolk and acquaintance, she could hear no tidings of Him. No hindrances stayed her, nor weariness, nor danger; but she forthwith returned to Jerusalem, and for three long days sought Him sorrowing. Great be your confusion, O my soul, who has so often lost your Jesus by your sins, and has given no heed to seek Him at once, a sign that you make very little or no account of the precious treasure of divine love. **Say one Hail Mary**

4. The meeting of Jesus and Mary on the Way of the Cross: "And there followed Him a great multitude of people, and of women, who bewailed and lamented Him." – Luke XXIII, 27. **Meditation**: Come, O ye sinners, come and see if ye can endure so sad a sight. This Mother, so tender and loving, meets her beloved Son, meets Him amid an impious rabble, who drag Him to a cruel death, wounded, torn by stripes, crowned with thorns, streaming with blood, bearing His heavy cross. Ah, consider, my soul, the grief of the blessed Virgin thus beholding her Son! Who would not weep at seeing this Mother's grief? But who has been the cause of such woe? I, it is I, who with my sins have so cruelly wounded the heart of my sorrowing Mother! And yet I am not moved; I am as a stone, when my heart should break because of my ingratitude. **Say one Hail Mary**

5. The Crucifixion: "They crucified Him. Now there stood by the cross of Jesus, His Mother. When Jesus therefore had seen His Mother and the disciple standing whom he loved, He said to His Mother: Woman: behold thy son. After that he said to the disciple: Behold thy Mother." – John XIX, I8-25-27.

Meditation: Look, devout soul, look to Calvary, whereon are raised two altars of sacrifice, one on the body of Jesus, the other on the heart of Mary. Sad is the sight of that dear Mother drowned in a sea of woe, seeing her beloved Son, part of her very self, cruelly nailed to the shameful tree of the cross. Ah me! how every blow of the hammer, how every stripe which fell on the Saviour's form, fell also on the disconsolate spirit of the Virgin. As she stood at the foot of the cross, pierced by the sword of sorrow, she turned her eyes on Him, until she knew that He lived no longer and had resigned His spirit to His Eternal Father. Then her own soul was like to have left the body and joined itself to that of Jesus. Say one Hail Mary

6. The taking down of the Body of Jesus from the Cross: "Joseph of Arimathea, a noble counsellor, came and went in boldly to Pilate, and begged the body of Jesus. And Joseph buying fine linen, and taking Him down, wrapped Him up in the fine linen." – Mark XV, 43-46.

Meditation: Consider the most bitter sorrow which rent the soul of Mary, when she saw the dead body of her dear Jesus on her knees, covered with blood, all torn with deep wounds. O mournful Mother, a bundle of myrrh, indeed, is thy Beloved to thee. Who would not pity thee? Whose heart would not be softened, seeing affliction which would move a stone? Behold John not to be comforted, Magdalen and the other Mary in deep affliction, and Nicodemus, who can scarcely bear his sorrow. Say one Hail Mary

7. The burial of Jesus: "Now there was in the place where He was crucified, a garden; and in the garden a new sepulchre, wherein no man yet had been laid. There, therefore, because of the passover of the Jews, they laid Jesus, because the sepulchre was nigh at hand." John XIX, 41-42.

Meditation: Consider the sighs which burst from Mary's sad heart when she saw her beloved Jesus laid within the tomb. What grief was hers when she saw the stone lifted to cover that sacred tomb! She gazed a last time on the lifeless body of her Son, and could scarce detach her eyes from those gaping wounds. And when the great stone was rolled to the door of the sepulchre, oh, then indeed her heart seemed torn from her body! Say one Hail Mary

There is a sign in a hospital foyer I visited recently which read:

Those who die in God's love go only as far as God . . . and God is very near.

What does it mean to die in God's love? To answer that, it's worth taking some time occasionally to read the obituaries which appear in the daily newspapers. The great and the unknown are included, the rich and famous, and those who lived their lives on what we might call a smaller canvas. To me, they remind us of the beauty and fragility of life. They are often sad, always heartfelt and those who have written them have done so with love and affection and the desire that this person's life be known and remembered. Universally the values of kindness, love, generosity, laughter and friendship are celebrated.

In these days, we can be very concerned with our own selves, our status, our wealth. They don't get a mention. Ideas like success, power and influence are not included in the best death notices or the obituaries. Humility, generosity, love and kindness are keenly remembered; wealth and social status rarely get a mention. I wonder is that what we mean 'to die in God's love'? Is it that God is very near to those who are generous and loving, open to others and humble in their outlook and the way they have lived their lives? Is that what it means to die in God's love. We used to define that in very narrow terms – being 'in sin' or not. Perhaps we need to look at that with different eyes so that we can understand what it means for us today.

Last year, Gail Kelly, the Chief Executive Officer of Westpac, retired. In her final message she spoke about having seen grown men and women of her age and more, in tears – they had lost sight of who they are, their spirituality, their inner person, she said.

Isn't that sad – these people in tears because of what they have lost along the way: a relationship, a partnership, they may not be connected to their children, maybe they've lost their health, maybe they've got no friends. They have no interests, they've lost sight of who they are, their spirituality, their inner person. They may be rich, powerful and even famous but...

She offered these further thoughts:

Generosity of spirit is an essential ingredient for being successful in your life, as well as your business; practicing generosity of spirit in the way you go about your life and indeed your leadership role in work. If you believe in practicing generosity of spirit, at heart you believe in the power of an individual to make a difference and at heart you treat individuals with deep respect and want to see others flourish. The people who do not practice generosity of spirit are selfish. People who do not practice generosity of spirit are binary: black or white, right or wrong; they are quick to judge, intolerant, they shoot messengers, they take credit for work that others do (Gail Kelly Chief Executive Officer of Westpac).

In the pressure of the rat race, the rush to succeed and prosper, we can easily lose sight of the inner self. When we are defined as 'economic units' or 'fiscal problems' (the old, the young, the unemployed, the sick for example), when we are cogs in a wheel, when we are refugees away from our homeland and the very things that define us, when we are unemployed or underemployed in a society that defines success in terms of status and wealth, losing touch with the inner self is pretty easy to do.

But when we listen to eulogies or read the obituaries, we hear a very different message. So many of the things that are held to be important today just melt away when death comes; when we come together to celebrate a life, to remember, to mourn our loss.

When I read some of these obituaries, I can't help but think of the welcome he or she must receive when they come into the fullness of God's presence. I know that we tend to 'sanctify' those who have died, we overlook shortcoming and faults but I wonder whether God does too. I wonder whether it will be a case of hearing the Lord saying, "Well done good and faithful Mary or John or....."

Sometimes obituaries write of couples who have died hours, days or weeks apart. I read somewhere that there is no space for "died of a broken heart" on the death certificate. And yet, how else to explain their passing within hours or days of a couple married for 60 or 70 years? I have seen that – not just in the obituaries either!! Isn't it a pity that we don't acknowledge that! What a wonderful tribute to a person – not that he or she died of overwork or climbing the social or corporate ladder but simply missing the one they loved. What a tribute to them. Surely God is very near to them, in life and in death. After all, God IS love. That reminded me of the line underneath the inscription in the hospital quoted above reads: To live in hearts we leave behind is not to die.

What do you want to be remembered for? Not later, in ten or twenty or thirty years time, but now! It is a sobering thought, isn't it!!!?

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The Church's gift of time (1)

So teach us to number our days that we may get a

Have you ever thought about how we experience time?

Time is something we take for granted yet is so mysterious. God's plan is revealed in time. Not only in the fullness of time, but in the gift of time itself. It is a gift, as it is a creation of God, and the dimension in which we go about receiving redemption.

What could God mean for us, to number our days?

We know someone whose sect doesn't hold with the celebration of feasts. No festivity for Christmas. None for Easter. To a Catholic who greets every saint's day as if it is the last chance to eat a celebratory bowl of ice cream, this is unimaginable. It makes you start thinking through the different kinds of time that God gives us.

He could have given us, simply, a day, if He thought that a day is what we needed for our sanctification. But then He would have limited our perception of time to that span. In other words, we would always think about time as comprising a day. A week, a month, a season, a year would all be unknown to us, because they would be superfluous to what was required for our nature.

Every day would be enough. We would wake up every morning with a renewed spirit. We would experience the challenges of each 24-hour period without reference to any other changes. In the evening, we would ask for forgiveness for the ways we had strayed when we were awake, and then we would retire. We would speak of being so many thousands of days old! If we wanted to celebrate, we would not have much time to prepare.

Of course, sometimes a day is enough — is all we can apprehend. "Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof" (Matthew 6:34). A good part of what we know to be true is contained in those words — that there is no use worrying about tomorrow or crying over yesterday. And, of course, there will come a day when a day is all we have left.

But that cannot be the whole story.

If it were, there would be no need for the week, with its seven days, the uphill climb of work, and then the mercy of rest on Sunday. A week is quite mysterious, by the way, and surely points to the truth of the unique character of Sunday, for whatever would possess all peoples to bunch their days together this way? It seems arbitrary. Why not three days or four? Surely that is more suited to the primitive (and by extension, presumptively infantile) mind, which, as psychologist Jean Piaget has shown, does not count beyond that low number. Or why not count the days by 10, to match the fingers? (Perhaps the Chinese went in this direction, but not for long.)

Even given the lunar calendar — which even the Babylonians found only awkwardly lined up with a

division of seven, yet they persisted — other numbers seem just as workable if we are breaking things up. And yet, seven it is.

There would be no need for the four seasons of the year, with their rhythm of growth, bounty, fading glory, and cold death. Without the seasons — without at least the idea of the seasons for those who do not have four — there would be no mirror of our spiritual life in the nature we see all around us.

And then there would not be the year, with its cycle that resolves into a spiral, going ever upward towards the light of man's span on earth. Recurrence yet forward motion.

Every year brings its reminder of what happened at this time last year. The reminder gladdens our hearts or renews mourning, as the case may be. We reflect more deeply on just what the birth of a long-awaited child meant to us, or just how we were, at the time, stunned by a departure.

Above all, we contemplate the events of salvation in order, with Christ in the centre, yet ever renewing. And that reflection deepens our awareness and our gratitude and our sorrow and our resolve.

But this deepening is not meant to occur only on the personal level. We see whole nations celebrating an event — say, victory over a foe — with the healing that remembrance brings.

The Church does this for us as well in her celebrations of the hours, the week, and the liturgical year. Our little oratory can help us follow her: in our home, we will keep alive the mystery that the Church is ever presenting to us.

We will limit ourselves here to observing the liturgical seasons at the prayer table. The possibilities would expand if we included the many customs the family can take part in to celebrate the liturgical year in the home.

The day with its hours

The book of Genesis speaks of "evening and morning, the first day", which seems to point to night, really. Think of sleep. It is a bit like not being created yet. It is also a bit like death. How you look at sleep depends, perhaps, on whether you see it as what comes before you start your day or what comes when you are finished with it.

In any case, morning comes with its promise of a new day. Every hour goes by, and it is an hour that has been lived before by all of humanity (including our Lord) — that is to say, noon happens the same way every day. Yet, it is also a new hour that has never been seen.

A day is a unit of sanctification. The Church lives and sanctifies these hours through what is called the Liturgy of the Hours — her liturgical prayer. This treasury of the Liturgy of the Hours covers all the other sorts of time as well — how to live them, how to sanctify them.
