



#### MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR WORK ON ST BERNARD'S CHURCH-Margaret Love

St Bernard's Parish Finance Committee, at its recent meeting, took the decision to proceed with work to arrest and prevent further damage from the penetrating dampness caused by the porosity of the bricks.

The work which was listed as a major project for the current thanksgiving program will cost \$44066.00. It will entail the removal of lichen from the brickwork, repairs to external brickwork affected by water deterioration, the application of three coats of Hydropel emulsion water repellent to the exterior of the church and the re-painting of parapet walls. It will commence shortly and take approximately eight weeks.

The committee was also required to determine and advise church authorities on the delineation of parish-owned land at 21 Gisborne Rd between that which can continue to be used by St Bernard's Primary School and that required for parish purposes.

# Along the track Following the Footsteps of Others

As the youngest in a large family I was often asked "Are you going to follow in your father's footsteps?" Or my brothers? I didn't. My father had me ear

marked for life on the farm. That wasn't my path.

Professor Joseph Campbell wrote that: "If you can see your path laid out in front of you step by step, you know it's not your path. You make your own path with every step you take. That's why it's your path. If the path before you is clear, you're probably on someone else's." \*

Finding your own path can be pretty hard. It is not always clear at any age. We spend a lot of time planning out what should happen next, where we want to go and how. We plan times and the routes to take on a journey. That's not a bad thing to do but so often, the unexpected, the wrong turns or detours turn out to be the best parts of the journey. That can be true of life too.

Isn't it sad that so many people believe that they need to become a version of someone else to be good enough, to fit in, to be accepted, to find happiness. That's a very destructive belief. It is easy to feel dissatisfied or inadequate – the advertising industry works very hard to make us so. We are deluged with ads about weight, how we should look, what we should wear, where we should go to be 'in.' There is enormous pressure to fit in, not just on young people but our whole economy is built on selling an image. When we are young we spend a lot of time thinking "I wish I could......". When we get older when it is finally time to just be yourself some just think "I wish I had have done this or that...."

Saint Pope John Paul wrote "The spirit is at work in the heart of every person, Christian or otherwise....." (Redemptoris Missio). In other words, deep down in every person the Spirit is at work. That Spirit is not just the source of our existence but She is lovingly at work helping each of us reach our full potential. That's what God wants for each of us, 'life to the full.' And that is different for each – we are all unique, all gifted in our own way. But we have to be open to that Spirit, willing to take on the challenge daily.

Life has many unexpected twists and turns. It is not predictable. In Joseph Campbell's words: "You must give up the life you planned in order to enjoy the life that is waiting for you." Sometimes we are so busy and engaged in working to make money, to secure our future, to make a name for ourselves, making our way that we miss the wonder of just being alive.

Many search for 'meaning in life' without firstly rejoicing in the experience of just being alive. How do we do that?

Firstly, by looking back, taking time every day to count our blessings. While this sounds easy, cultivating this habit only happens when we are intentional about setting time aside for it, to think about those who are dear to us, to think about what we are grateful for. In that way we can come to see the Spirit at work.

The second question to ask is: how do I respond to those who cross our path, to those we seek me out – did I give them time? My attention? Did I listen? How did I use the gifts I have been given? That's what they are for – for the people who cross our paths, who call out a response from within us. We find real meaning and purpose in life when we reach out and give ourselves for the sake of others. It is in reaching out to others that we can be liberated from fear, from feeling inadequate, unloved.

The third question is about looking forward – where am I going? Is that where I really want to go? Why? When we get up in the morning to start another day our lives can appear very mundane, very routine, same old, same old. So what is it that I love about what I do? What gives me hope today? What am I looking forward to? Will we treat the unexpected as a pest or a possibility?

It is not easy for most of us to make radical changes in our lives but we can make smaller ones that add up eventually to the greater ones. Any journey begins with the first step, particularly the journey to build a better you.

The last words go to Slim Dusty from his song Looking Forward, Looking Back:

There are strange days
Full of change on the way
But we'll be fine, unlike some
I'll be leaning forward, to see what's coming.

# Twelve Latin words that shaped the Faith (part 1)

We all know that Latin is the language of the Church. While you may not need to know Latin to understand the Mass anymore, it is impossible to imagine the Christian faith as we know it without Latin — including where the word "Mass" comes from.

Here are the first six of 12 words that have shaped the faith in Western Christendom.

#### **GRATIA**

Grace — it is what we all need and what none of us can earn through our own efforts apart from God. This most simple and fundamental word in our vocabulary of faith has its origins in the Latin word gratia. Those readers who have ever said the Hail Mary in Latin may be familiar with the phrase plena gratia — full of grace. In Latin, gratia has the primary meaning of favour, goodwill, kindness, and friendship.

#### PREX

This is one of the means through which we receive grace. And, like grace, it is a word most of us would not suspect of being Latinate: prayer. But dictionaries tell us that our verb "to pray" originates with the Latin verb *precari*, meaning beg, implore, entreat, supplicate. That Latin word in turn comes from the Latin noun *prex*, simply translated as prayer or request.

#### TRINITATEM

Latin has also given us one the chief words we use to describe to Whom we pray: the Trinity. The Latin source for this word is *trinitatem*, a term denoting "three". Largely for its first two centuries, Trinity as a term describing God was unknown to the Christian world. It was first coined by the Latin Father Tertullian, writing in the early part of the third century.

#### PERSONA

Person is a crucial word, not just in our theological vocabulary, but also in Western culture. Again, without Latin, we would not have this word. It is lifted straight out of the ancient language, from *persona*. This originally referred to the masks characters would wear in a dramatic performance on stage. Then it came to refer to the characters themselves. It later came to have a much more substantial meaning and was used by the early Church Fathers to describe God as three persons, one in being.

#### **INCARNARE**

"And the Word was made flesh." So reads the beginning of John's Gospel (1:14). In the Greek text of the New Testament, this reads: Kai ho Logos sarx egeneto, but the word we mostly commonly use to describe what happened to the second person of the Trinity — Incarnation — is not taken from these Greek words. Instead it is from the Latin incarnare, "to make flesh". This verb is built off the noun caro, meat, flesh. We can see this root word in several other English words today, including carnivore, carnage, and even carnation.

#### **CREDO**

Our profession of belief in the Trinity — three persons in one God — is expressed in our creeds. The word creed itself is right from the Latin *credo*, to trust in, believe, rely on. This word also appears in one of the key Latin phrases of Catholicism, *lex orandi, lex credendi* — the law of praying is the law of believing, meaning how we pray (and worship in the liturgy) reflects, or should reflect, our belief.
