Australia Day

For all the controversy around the date, there is much to celebrate about Australia. It is an ancient, vast and beautiful country with a history few can match.

The first to set down roots here were the Aboriginal people. In the words of Pope Saint John Paul II's message to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in Alice Springs: As the human family spread over the face of the earth, your people settled and lived in this big country that stood apart from all the others... for thousands of years you have lived in this land and fashioned a culture that endures to this day. And during all this time, the Spirit of God has been with you.

In recent times, people from all over the world have joined them, people from different cultures and beliefs, from different traditions speaking different languages, people with skills and talents that have enriched Australia. So many have come here, in the First Fleet somewhat reluctantly and later those seeking a new start, those who have come with dreams of a better future and others seeking safe harbour. Over decades, Australia has become a dreamtime place where those in search of a new beginning have found a place to call home. And they brought with them the shared dream of creating a new life and in so doing have helped create a richer nation in every sense of the word. And that is still happening. In a very real sense, we are still 'becoming Australia.' We live in a country that is still finding its soul and its voice.

Despite differences and disagreements, tensions and at times conflict, we are a remarkably peaceful country. Unlike some other countries, even when elections are hard fought, at times marred by bitterness, we accept the result and move on. Sectarianism has raised its ugly face over our history but it has never really found a lasting foothold. In contrast, our ethnic differences have become a source of pride. It is true that Australia is one of the most successful multi-cultural nations in the world.

It is a joy to travel across this vast place. Over the horizon lies different landscapes which all have their unique beauty. There seems to be a little bit of the world tucked away somewhere in Australia. It is a land of contrasts. It can be a tough country to move through sometimes and the people who live there have a survival resilience and humour. In other places, wealth has enabled people to luxuriate (literally) in some of the most beautiful landscapes to be seen anywhere. When the north suffers through floods, the south can be in drought. Cyclones can crash across the northern coastlines while southerners go to the beach. The north takes its revenge when the south suffers through the winter months and the tropics offer the perfect antidote!

But we have made mistakes. This is a fragile place. Travelling across this vast country we witness how we have over exploited the land and its resources. Gaping holes mark abandoned mines. Vast tracts of land have been eroded. Water is still as precious as ever but the river flows have become erratic through overuse and mismanagement. Longer and longer droughts are having a very long lasting and devastating impact. Climate change is taking a heavy toll on perhaps our most spectacular and precious landmark - the Great Barrier Reef as well as farm lands that once gave up seemingly unending harvests. Our bush has been depleted and along with that our precious and unique wildlife. The increasing population that is an inevitable part of our future is creating tensions that cannot be ignored.

Australia Day gives us cause to celebrate and rightly so. This is a wonderful country. Australians are a generous, fun loving, sports mad people. We can travel from one end of this country to the other and feel both safe and welcome. Criticism of this day provokes strong reactions and that is understandable - such criticism or questioning is regarded as an attack on what we love and its role in making us a people. That can create a lot of anxiety in many Australians. But this day ought to give us pause for reflection too. Has our underlying myth of a 'fair go' become just that - a myth? The first people of our land, the Aboriginal people deserve better. They and their wisdom are not really included. The refugee deserves better. In this land of contrasts where wealth and poverty live side by side how long can we continue to ignore the homeless and the hungry, how long can we continue to listen to those who vilify them, how long will we listen to those who say 'go back to where you came from without' - how long before we stand up and say "Enough!' Australia Day is a reminder that if we are to live in harmony with each other and our land, we need to work at it. The First Settlers could teach us a thing or two about that! Australia is above all a place of hope.

We have lived through a dreadful time – the pandemic split Australia. We could not cross borders, sometimes those created even in our own state. Some parts of Australia endured long periods of lockdown and that was hard. "The Economy" became the catch cry rather than the welfare of the people who make it a reality. Australia is an idea as much as a place. What do you think it looks like? What do you want it to be?

Deep questions, only hints at answers Part Two


Iture. •Psalm 91: "For he will give his angels charge of you to guard you in all your ways. On their hands they will bear you up, lest you dash your foot against a stone Because he clings to me in love, I will deliver him; I will protect him, because he knows my name." (9-16; this Psalm is a good example of how what can be applied to anyone who clings to God can be applied pre-eminently to Christ Himself.)

Psalm 118: "This is the gate of the LORD; the righteous shall enter through it. I thank you that you have answered me and have become my salvation. The stone which the builders rejected has become the cornerstone. This is the LORD's doing; it is marvellous in our eyes. This is the day which the LORD has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it." (20-24)

Suffering and Salvation

It is evident that many of the Messianic psalms - those that speak more or less directly of Christ or that look forward to a time of definitive triumph and joy – are closely united to the two other themes I mentioned. Often, there is an intense personal or national suffering which preoccupies the psalmist, and this leads him to ponder his own end, the end of the Jewish people, and even at times the end of all mankind.

But there is a remarkable ambivalence in the Psalms about these matters. When the psalmist teaches in Psalm 1 that "the LORD knows the way of the righteous but the way of the wicked perishes" (6), there is surely a hint that the difference between the righteous and the wicked is a matter of living in the LORD. But sometimes the goal seems only to be earthly triumph over enemies, so that the

psalmist or the present generation can live a long and secure life before passing away.

When considered in the context of persistent suffering, Psalm 39 even goes so far as to plead with God to leave the psalmist alone: "Look away from me, that I may know gladness, before I depart and be no more" (13), and several Psalms - such as Psalm 30 make an argument out of this question: "What profit is there in my death ...? Will the dust praise you?" (9).

At other times, salvation seems to be regarded as the survival and prosperity of God's people as a people, without regard to the distinct persons who have died, or even as simply the ongoing possession of the land. The idea of "posterity" is one way the Psalms reconcile the fleeting life of the individual with the endurance of God (see, for example, Psalm 102).

And yet there are many hints of an eternity caught up with God. Otherwise, this verse from 116 would be sheer nonsense: Psalm "Precious in the sight of the LORD is the death of his saints" (15).

When the Psalms were composed, the definitive salvation by our God through Christ was still far off. To Christians, however, the combination of Christ, suffering, and our final end sounds very like a plan.
