

REFLECTION 3RD SUNDAY EASTER—MARY FERMIO rsj

Most of us have experienced sitting around a barbecue or campfire and how it invites conversation and friendship, as a meal is shared. Here community is built, and experiences shared, as each person brings along something to contribute.

Jesus had prepared a fire and had bread and fish ready to share with his friends, who by following Jesus's directions, caught fish to contribute. But Jesus had changed somewhat, even though they knew it was he. While sharing around the fire, Jesus asked Peter three times if he loved him and installed Peter as leader of the flock. How humbling this must have been for Peter in front of all his mates, remembering his boast to die for Jesus and then to disown him three times.

At Mass we come as a community around the Lord's table to share friendship, food and to listen to the words of Jesus. We bring our gifts of bread and wine to be changed into gifts for us, no longer bread and wine but Jesus himself. Like Peter we are also commissioned to tend the flock, when the Priest says: **Go...** We are sent to live the Gospel with our lives, witnessing to our love of God and others. But we will only succeed if we keep in touch with the Risen Jesus who continues to guide and nourish us.

GOSPEL John 21:1-19

Jesus showed himself again to his disciples. It was by the Sea of Tiberias, and it happened like this: Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee and two more of his disciples were together. Simon Peter said, 'I'm going fishing.' They replied, 'We'll come with you.' They went out and got into the boat but caught nothing that night.

It was light by now and there stood Jesus on the shore, though the disciples did not realise that it was Jesus. Jesus called out, 'Have you caught anything, friends?' And when they answered, 'No,' he said, 'Throw the net out to starboard and you'll find something.' So they dropped the net, and there were so many fish that they could not haul it in. The disciple Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord.' At these words 'It is the Lord,' Simon Peter, who had practically nothing on, wrapped his cloak round him and jumped into the water. The other disciples came on in the boat, towing the net and the fish; they were only about a hundred yards from land.

As soon as they came ashore they saw that there was some bread there, and a charcoal fire with fish cooking on it. Jesus said, 'Bring some of the fish you have just caught.' Simon Peter went aboard and dragged the net to the shore, full of big fish, one hundred and fiftythree of them; and in spite of there being so many the net was not broken. Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' None of the disciples was bold enough to ask, 'who are you?'; they knew quite well it was the Lord. Jesus then stepped forward, took the bread and gave it to them, and the same with the fish. This was the third time that Jesus showed himself to the disciples after rising from the dead. After the meal Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these others do?' He answered, 'Yes Lord, you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.' A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He replied 'Yes, Lord, you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Look after my sheep.' Then he said to him a third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter was upset that he asked him the third time, 'Do you love me?' and said, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep. 'I tell you most solemnly,

when you were young you put on your own belt and walked where you liked; but when you grow old you will stretch out your hands,

and somebody else will put a belt around you and take you where you would rather not go.'

In these words he indicated the kind of death by which Peter would give glory to God. After this he said, 'Follow me.

St Bernard VII

In the Bulletin for Sunday January 23, 2022, we had an overview of the life of St Bernard of Clairvaux. Here, we give a little more detail of the life of this saint, who combined the active and contemplative in a superlative manner.

Bernard was born in 1090, at Fontaines, near Dijon. In central France and died at o Clairvaux, August 21, 1153. His parents were Tescelin, Lord of Fontaines, and Aleth of Montbard, both belonging to the highest nobility of Burgundy.

Bernard, the third of a family of seven children, six of whom were sons, was educated with particular care, because, while yet unborn, a devout man had foretold his great destiny. At the age of nine, Bernard was sent to a much renowned school at Chatillon-sur-Seine, about 100 kilometres north of Dijon. He had a great taste for literature and devoted himself for some time to poetry.

His success in his studies won the admiration of his masters, and his growth in virtue was no less marked. Bernard's great desire was to excel in literature in order to take up the study of Sacred Scripture, which later on became, as it were, his own tongue.

He had a special devotion to the Blessed Virgin, and there is no one who speaks more sublimely of the Queen of Heaven. During his youth, he did not escape trying temptations, but his virtue triumphed over them, in many instances in a heroic manner, and from this time he thought of retiring from the world and living a life of solitude and prayer.

St Robert, Abbot of Molesmes, had founded. in 1098, the monastery of Citeaux, near Dijon, with the purpose of restoring the Rule of St Benedict in all its rigour. Returning to Molesmes, he left the government of the new abbey to St Alberic, who died in the year 1109. St Stephen had just succeeded him (1113) as third Abbot of Citeaux, when Bernard with 30 young noblemen of Burgundy, sought admission into the order.

Three years later, St Stephen sent the young Bernard, at the head of a band of monks, to found a new house at Vallee d'Absinthe (Valley of Bitterness), in the Diocese of Langres. This Bernard named Claire Vallee, or Clairvaux, on

June 25, 1115, and the names of Bernard and Clairvaux thence became inseparable.

During the absence of the Bishop of Langres, Bernard was blessed as Abbot by William of Champeaux, Bishop of Chalons-sur-Marne, who saw in him the predestined man, servum Dei. From that moment, a strong friendship sprang up between the Abbot and the Bishop, who was professor of theology at Notre Dame of Paris.

The beginnings of Clairvaux were trying and painful. The regime was so austere that Bernard's health was impaired by it, and only the influence of his friend William of Champeaux and the authority of the General Chapter could make him mitigate his austerities.

The monastery. however, made progress. Disciples flocked to it in great numbers, desirous of putting themselves under the direction of Bernard. His father, the aged Tescelin, and all his brothers entered Clairvaux as religious, leaving only Humbeline, his sister, in the world; and she, with the consent of her husband, soon took the veil in the Benedictine Convent of Jully.

Clairvaux becoming too small for the many religious who crowded there, so they send out bands to found new houses. In 1118, the Monastery of the Three Fountains was founded at Chalons; in 1119, that of Fontenay in the Diocese of Auton (now Dijon); and in 1121, that of Foigny, in the Diocese of Lain (now Soisson).
